A common enemy

THE carnage unleashed by the militant Islamic State group in Kabul on Friday is a chilling reminder that this implacable enemy has much to gain from continuing chaos in Afghanistan. Around 30 people were killed and at least 81 wounded when a gathering of Shia Hazaras in the capital was targeted by gunmen belonging to the terrorist outfit. A transnational Islamist group such as IS poses a threat to the entire region; it constantly seeks cross-border allies amongst like-minded violent extremists in its quest for global dominance. The situation thus calls for more than the government in Kabul and the Afghan Taliban to find a way to work together following the withdrawal of foreign forces from their country. It requires that Afghanistan and Pakistan and potentially Iran, given the many sectarian attacks carried out by IS coordinate intelligence-gathering and tactical planning, and perhaps to some extent consider operational coordination, if they are to vanquish the terrorist group. Moreover, strategic objectives have changed in the current political scenario, requiring a recalibration of (tacit) alliances. The Taliban, locked in battle with Nato and Afghan security forces and reluctant to open up another front turned a blind eye to TTP militants fleeing military operations in Pakistan's tribal areas and seeking shelter inside Afghanistan. Similarly, the Afghan government, not to mention the US, did the same to gain leverage against Pakistan. When IS expanded its franchise to Afghanistan, it easily found recruits from within the increasingly radicalised local population, and became a direct threat to the Taliban's largely ethnolocalist movement by appealing to the same demographic. The Taliban even lost to the IS some of its more headline fighters who were violently opposed to talks with the US and influenced by the terrorist outfit's pan-Islamist ambitions. Pakistani militants, however mostly former TTP elements comprise the largest component, with Central Asians making up the rest.

VIOLENCE against women in Pakistan is both a crime and a socially accepted norm. While we have laws that protect women from violence, the state has absolved itself of the responsibility to enforce these laws. This means that women have an inherently paradoxical relationship with the state: with one hand the state gives women rights in the form of constitutional guarantees, international treaty commitments and some progressive legislation; with the other it takes away these rights by refusing to implement these laws or take measures to create the conditions under which these rights can be realised. The guarantee of formal equality and the obstinate refusal to grant substantive equality mirrors the behaviour of an abusive spouse who somehow convinces you that you need him even as he abuses you. When he suspects that you are about to leave him, he promises to change and may even

behave well for a few days, before going back to his old ways. Similarly, in response to daily reports of brutality against women and abysmal gender equality indicators, our state authorities will take certain measures periodically. There is widespread rhetoric about the integral role of women in the development of a nation; laws seeking to protect women are enacted; entire departments within the government are set up exclusively devoted to the development of women. When it comes to effectively protecting women against violence rooted in patriarchy, however, these same state authorities become either apathetic or complicit. This is not to say that formal equality is insignificant. It is crucial in a context where social and cultural norms relegate women to subservient roles and render them highly vulnerable. It is a valuable particularly in view of the fact that there was a time in Pakistan's history when discrimination against women was official state policy. During Gen Ziaul Haq's era, the state pursued an active agenda to preserve the sub-

servient status of women. This period saw the enforcement of discriminatory policies and the imprisonment of women under Hudood laws. Zia's overt discrimination against women depended on conflating the suppression of women with tenets of Islam, and the portrayal of demands of gender equality as anti-religious. This insidious discourse continues to impede the movement for gender equality long after Zia is gone, and even after some of the pernicious laws passed under his time have been substantially chipped away. The association of equal citizenship of women with an 'anti-Islam' agenda continues to haunt the women's movement. The fact that today the slogan 'mera jism, meri marzi' is deemed an insult to the religious and cultural values of the country is, in part, a result of Zia's legacy. Thank(s) in large part to the women's movement galvanised during Zia's era, as well as a powerful global movement for women's rights, subsequent governments have not pursued an overtly misogynistic state

policy. Instead, the last few decades have seen a slew of policies and programmes aimed to prevent violence against women. In 1995, Pakistan became a party to the Beijing Platform for Action, thereby committing to a range of policy measures to end all forms of discrimination against women, some years later, the National Commission on the Status of Women was set up to monitor the state's response to the progress of women. To respond to violence against women, the government proposed the establishment of women police stations. A number of initiatives to provide shelter and safe accommodation for women were rolled out crisis centres, safe houses and working women hostels. Recent years have also seen the enactment of progressive laws to protect and punish violence against women, including laws prohibiting domestic violence and sexual harassment in the workplace. The execution of these laws and policies, however, belies the complete lack of interest of the state to respond to violence against

women. Neither budget nor personnel are allocated to enforce laws intended to protect women. There is impunity for law-enforcement authorities refusing to prevent and punish crimes against women. Zia's overt discrimination against women depended on conflating the suppression of women with tenets of Islam, and the portrayal of demands of gender equality as anti-religious. This insidious discourse continues to impede the movement for gender equality long after Zia is gone, and even after some of the pernicious laws passed under his time have been substantially chipped away. Rizvia rescue operation concludes

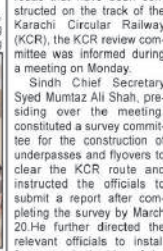
KARACHI: The rescue operation following the collapse of a five-storey building in Rizvia Society was completed on Sunday night, while the building owner, Muhammad Javed Khan, has still not been arrested. As many as 27 bodies and several injured persons had been found during the four-day rescue operation. The building had collapsed on Thursday, destroying two cars and leaving the adjoining building bent, leading to fears that it too may collapse. Several parts of a third building also collapsed, while a fourth building was declared 'dangerous' by the authorities. One of the buildings was vacated after



officials declared that it was also at risk of caving in. Rescue operations were carried out by the police, Rangers, army, fire department, Sindh Building Control Authority (SCBA) and relief services, with the assistance of area residents. After rescue teams cleared the area, those affected by the tragedy gathered at the site, surveying the rubble that once was their home. Complaining that no government officials had come to their aid, they expressed worries about how they would set up their residences once again. "Who will compensate us for the loss of lives and

24 new underpasses, flyovers needed to clear KCR routes

KARACHI: As many as 24 underpasses and flyovers must be built to bypass the



roads that have been constructed on the track of the Karachi Circular Railway (KCR), the KCR review committee was informed during a meeting on Monday. Sindh Chief Secretary Syed Mumtaz Ali Shah, presiding over the meeting, constituted a survey committee for the construction of underpasses and flyovers to clear the KCR route and instructed the officials to submit a report after completing the survey by March 20. He further directed the relevant officials to install fences on both sides of the track following Pakistan Railway's Right of Way. 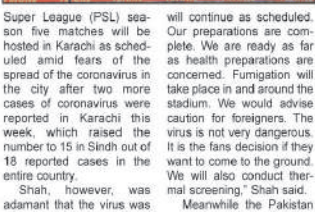

TDAP's Consultation with Exporters for new GSP Scheme of the UK in Lahore

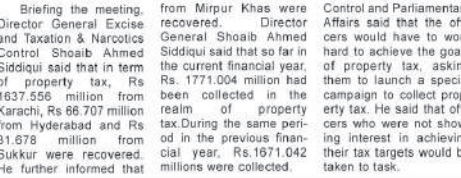
In wake of Brexit, Department of International Trade, UK (DIT) and Department for International Development, UK (DFID) are developing their own scheme for the Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) that will become effective from January, 2021 after completion of the transition period. Besides that, the UK is also undertaking a review of its current MFN tariff regime for its further rationalization. UK Government has sought inputs from Pakistan for designing of the new scheme which will maintain the current level of preferential access available to Pakistan under the EU's GSP/ CDP Plus scheme. To obtain stakeholders' inputs, TDAP organized a consultative session with concerned trade bodies and exporters today at Pakistan Hosiery Manufacturers & Exporters Association (PHMA) Office Lahore to seek proposals for making the new UK GSP scheme more user friendly, improving trade



regime and MFN tariffs as well as avenues for improving overall trade and cooperation between the UK and Pakistan were covered. This included broad parameters for the new GSP scheme and MFN tariff rationalization, origin certification system and rules of origin, standards and compliances, and TDAP. Some of the major exporters like US Apparel, Arguard 9, Servis, Master Textile etc. attended the session. TDAP is planning to hold similar consultative sessions with trade bodies and exporters during this week on 10th, and 11th March, 2020 at Faisalabad and Sialkot, respectively.

investigation launched in emblezment of funds in sindh house islamabad

KARACHI MARCH 11: Sindh Anti-Corruption Department has launched an investigation into the alleged emblezment of development funds and mega corruption in Sindh House Islamabad Staff Colony. According to details, the complaints were received regarding emblezments/ misappropriation of development funds allocated for Sindh House Islamabad Staff Colony. It is pertinent to mention that from the year 2015 to 2019-20, 13 crore 82 lakh 45 thousand and 700 rupees were released for the development works of Staff Colony Sindh House Islamabad. However, provincial building division Works Karachi officials usurped all the money through fake bills and vouchers and not a single rupee was spent on development works. The inquiry was ordered by Provincial Minister for Anti-Corruption Jam Ikrumulah Dharejo on complaints of corruption in the aforementioned project. Anti-Corruption Sindh Department, following the orders of the Sindh minister for Anti-Corruption, has launched an investigations against the officers of Provincial Building Division Works Karachi.
